MAURA CORRIGAN WINS FIFTH ANNUAL LEONARD R. GILMAN AWARD



Detroit Chapter Vice-President and former Chief Assistant United States Attorney Maura D. Corrigan was awarded the Fifth Annual Leonard R. Gilman Award at the Gilman Award Luncheon held May 25, 1989, in the Riverfront Ballroom, Detroit Westin Hotel. More than 130 lawyers and judges were in attendance as Ms. Corrigan was presented the award by Chapter Secretary and former recipient Joel M. Shere. In presenting the award, Mr. Shere emphasized Ms. Corrigan's distin-

guished record of public service, including her earlier roles as Chief of the Appellate Division of the U.S. Attorneys' Office and as Assistant Prosecuting Attorney in the Wayne County Prosecutors' Office. In accepting the award, Ms. Corrigan indicated that she wished that there had been no occasion to create a Leonard R. Gilman Award. She said she was honored not only to receive an award named for Lenny Gilman, but also to join a distinguished group of prior recipients.

Following the award presentation, Judge Bernard A. Friedman entertained the large assemblage with his remarks entitled "Smile, You're in Federal Court."

NEW LAWYERS SEMINAR RESCHEDULED

Because of the State Bar's delay in releasing the results of the February, 1989 bar examination, the New Lawyers Seminar has been rescheduled to Tuesday and Wednesday, June 20-21, 1989, in Room 115 U.S.Courthouse. 


